What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	68%	Before we started the swimming lessons, we had 44% (11/25) non-swimmers. 3/11 can now swim 25m and the rest 8/11 can swim up to 20m. Although they didn't meet the NC requirement, they have made tremendous progress.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	56%	We had a strong top group at swimming who swam all of the strokes confidently and a number of other children who were good swimmers but need some more work on the effectiveness of their strokes.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	100%	All children were able to perform self-rescue in the water and were able to get out of the pool safely.

Have you done this?	Yes	4 of our pupils took part in the top-up sessions which allowed another child to meet the NC requirement of swimming 25m.
